

- Takiribime



One of the gods in charge of the ocean has different names in Kojiki and Japanese Secretary. Considering the balance of all the characters, this time we need to design the characters according to the name of [Takumi Hime] in many myths.

Her name is derived from the fog, but also has the meaning of 'turbulent'. Although she is usually a gentle big sister, she becomes emotional when fighting. A bit sickly attribute, a character that is unpredictable like a fog. Even if the character does not run rampant, there will be some sick lines. It will become more brutal when running rampantly.

Takiri-bime (also known as Tagiri-hime) is a Shinto goddess from Japanese mythology and one of the 'Munakata-Sanjoshin' (the three goddesses enshrined in Munakata-taisha Shrine). In the Kojiki (Records of Ancient Matters), "Takiri-bime" is written "多紀理毘売命", whereas in the Nihon

Shoki (Chronicles of Japan), the name is recorded as "田心姫"(Tagori-hime) or "田霧姫" (Tagiri-hime). She is also known as Okitsushima-hime, but according to the third addendum to the Nihonshoki, this name is an alias of Ichikishima-hime.

When Susanoo (the god of the sea and storms) made a pledge to his sister, Amaterasu (the sun goddess), to prove his sincerity, Amaterasu received a sword from Susanoo and gave birth to three goddesses, known as the 'Munakata-Sanjoshin.'

It was declared that these three goddesses were daughters of Susanoo, because they were born from his sword. It is recorded that these three goddesses were worshipped by people in the Munakata region. There are some differences between the descriptions in the Kojiki and the Nihonshoki about the order of their birth and where they were enshrined.

According to the Kojiki, she was born first, named Takiri-hime (多紀理毘売命) and enshrined in Okitsumiya. Also known as Okitsushima-hime (奥津島比売命). According to the main text of the Nihonshoki, she was born first, named Tagori-hime (田心姫) and enshrined in Okitsumiya.

According to the first addendum to the Nihonshoki, she was born third, named Tagori-hime (田心姫) and enshrined in Hetsunomiya. According to the second addendum to the the Nihonshoki, she was born second, named Tagori-hime (田心姫) and enshrined in Nakatsumiya. According to the third addendum to the Nihonshoki, she was born third, named Tagiri-hime (田霧姫) and enshrined in Hetsunomiya.

She is enshrined as Tagori-hime (田心姫神) in Okitsumiya, one of the shrines that make

up Munakata-taisha Shrine. In the genealogy of Okuninushi in the Kojiki, it is written that she gave birth to Okuninushi's children, Ajisukitakahikone and Shitateruhime.

The 'Takiri' part of her name can be interpreted in two ways; one meaning is 'fog at the sea' and the other is 'rapids,' signifying the swift current of the Amanoyasukawa river. The word 'Tagori' in the Nihonshoki derives from 'Tagiri.'

- Oyamatsumi



Oyamatsumi, also known as Ōyamatsumi no Kami, is a deity in Japanese mythology. He is a god of mountains, seas, and warfare, and he is one of the offspring of Izanagi and Izanami, the two deities responsible for creating the islands of Japan. In our storyline we will use this name to represent a Goddess.

The name "Oyamatsumi" translates roughly to "Great Mountain Lord," which reflects his dominion over mountains and all the life that they support. As such, he is often associated with nature and the physical world, including elements like trees, rocks, and rivers.

Oyamatsumi is also the elder brother of Amaterasu (the Sun Goddess) and Susanoo (the Storm God). There are various stories in Japanese mythology that involve the interactions between these sibling deities. For instance, in one story, Oyamatsumi helped mediate a dispute between Amaterasu and Susanoo. It's worth noting that the specific details and interpretations of these myths can vary significantly, as they've been passed down and reshaped over many centuries. Today, Oyamatsumi is still revered in some Shinto practices and ceremonies.

His influence is particularly seen in the Shugendo tradition, which blends aspects of Shintoism and Buddhism, and emphasises ascetic practices in the mountains.

- Omoikanenokami



Omoikane (思兼 or 思金) is a Shinto god of wisdom and intelligence. His name means "serving one's thoughts." A heavenly deity who is called upon to "ponder" and give good counsel in the deliberations of the heavenly deities. In the myth where Amaterasu hid in a cave, he was tasked to find a way to get her out.

He is known by other names as Tokoyo-no-Omoikane (常世思金神) in the Kojiki (古事記); Omoikane (思兼神) in the Nihon (日本書紀); Omokane (思金神, 思兼神), Tokoyo-no-Omoikane (常世思金神), Yagokoro-omoikane (八意思兼神, 八意思金神) in the Kujiki (旧事紀 or Sendai Kuji Hongi 先代旧事本紀), or Achihiko (阿智彦).

He is the son of creator deity Takamimusubi (高御産巣日神) and the older brother of Takuhatachiji-hime (栲幡千千姫命, or commonly named in the Kojiki: 万幡豊秋津師比売命 Yorozuhatatoyo'akitsushi-hime), who is the wife of the deity Ame-no-Oshihomimi (天忍穂耳命).

However, in the Kujiki (旧事紀 or Sendai Hongi 先代旧事本紀). Omoikane Kuji descends to Shinano Province (信濃国 Shinano-no-kuni, a former province that is now Nagano Prefecture) to become the ancestor Shina-no-achihouri (信之阿智祝) and as in Chichibu Province (知々夫国, Chichibu no kuni), a former province in Saitama Prefecture. He then becomes the father of both deities Ame-no-Uwaharu (天表春命) and Ame-no-Shitaharu (天下春命), also through this lineage become the patriarchal ancestor of the children of Ama-no-Koyane (天児屋命, 天児屋根命).

Omoikanenokami for the humanity

In a realm beyond the mortal world, where the threads of destiny are woven and the balance of existence is maintained, there existed a deity known as Omoikanenokami.
